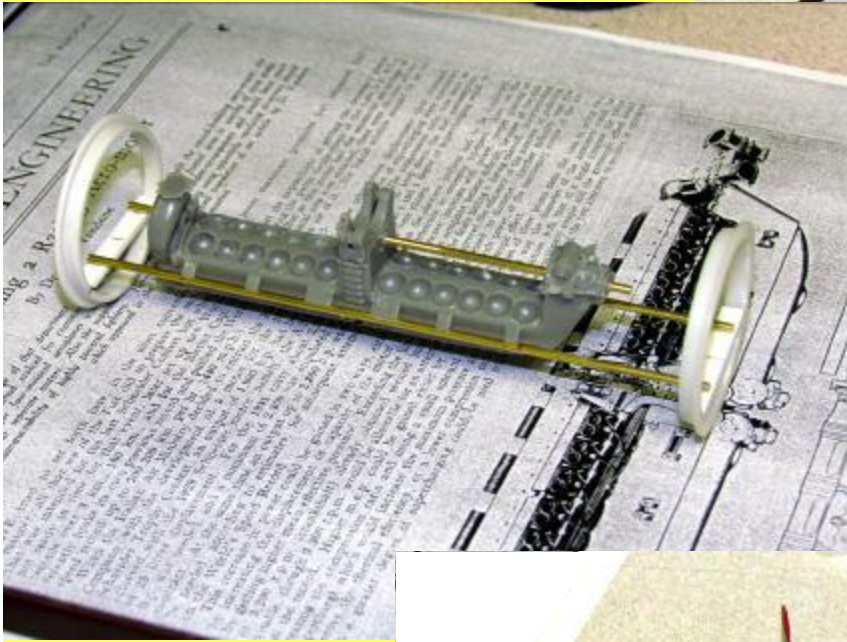
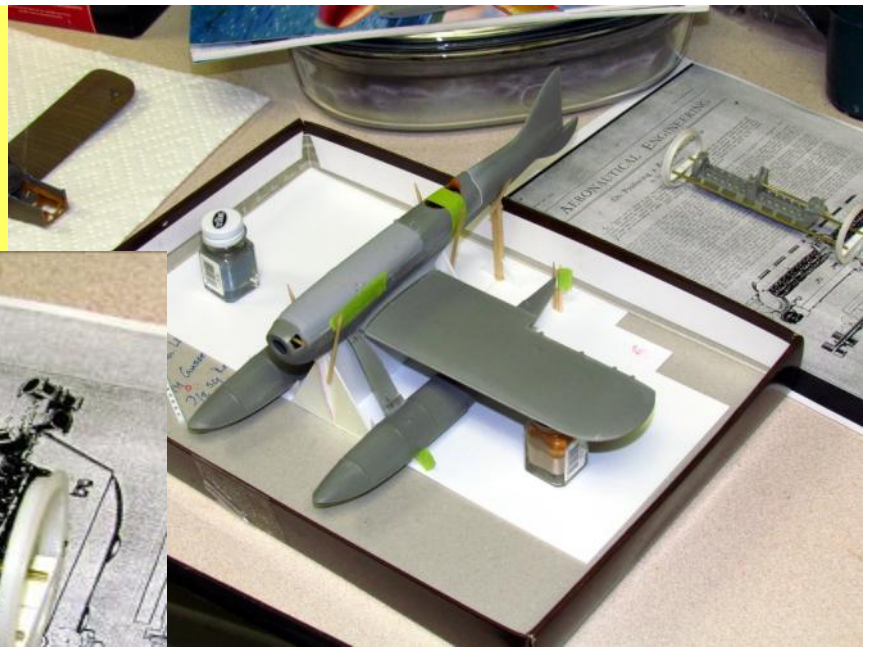

Flory/Promodeler Clay-Based Washes

I've started experimenting with Flory/Promodeler clay-based washes; they work great! They are available in the US from Sprue Bros. Here's a picture of a Pzkwf. III with some of it on there; I've probably wiped off too much; the thing's looking a little too clean. But if you look at the detail, you'll see the shadowing effect of the wash. Once you've let your gloss coat dry really well (after a few days), you just brush the stuff on all over and it runs into all the right places. Then you wipe it off where you don't want it. It's a whole lot easier than trying to get oil washes into little places with a brush. Anyhow, I thought you might want to throw this into the newsletter. I plan to bring the kit to the next meeting and, btw, if anybody wants the figures they can have them (this is from the old Tamiya III kit).

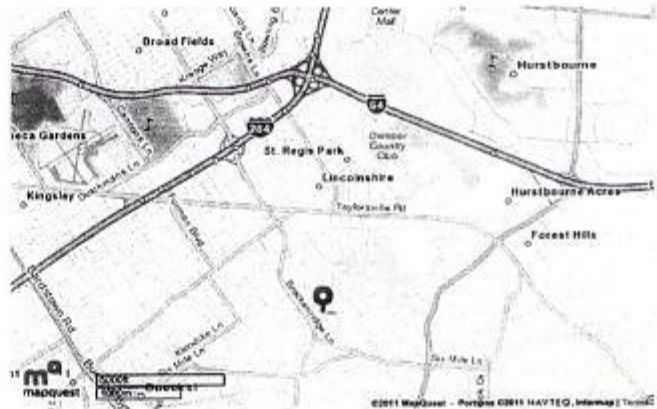

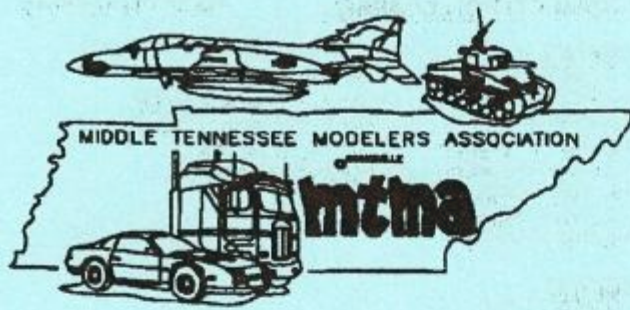

1. THIS CONTEST IS STRICTLY FOR STATIC SCALE MODELS CONSTRUCTED FROM UNASSEMBLED - UNFINISHED COMMERCIAL PLASTIC, RESIN, OR METAL KITS. SCRATCH-BUILT MODELS ARE WELCOME. PRE-ASSEMBLED AND PRE-FINISHED MODELS, TOYS, OR REPLICAS OF ANY KIND ARE NOT ELIGIBLE FOR AWARDS.
2. COMPETITION CLASSES ARE OPEN TO THE PUBLIC. PAST WINNING MODELS FROM PREVIOUS MTMA SHOWS ARE NOT PERMITTED TO ENTER THE COMPETITION. THEY MAY BE DISPLAYED ONLY!
3. MODELS MUST BE ENTERED UNDER THE NAME OF THE BUILDER. "GHOST" ENTRIES ARE CHARGED STANDARD ENTRY FEES TO THE PERSON ENTERING THEM. ENTRANTS MUST COMPLETE REGISTRATION BEFORE ENTERING THE SHOW.
4. SHOW OFFICIALS WILL ASSIST THE ENTRANT IN DETERMINING EACH ENTRIES CLASS. OUR INTENT IS TO GROUP MODELS OF SIMILAR SIZE, CONFIGURATION, & DETAILING; AND THIS IS THE CRITERION USED TO CLASS SUBJECTS OF ODD SCALE OR SUBJECT.
5. TEAMS OF EXPERIENCED JUDGES EVALUATE THE ENTRIES FOR SKILL, ACCURACY, AND OVERALL REALISM. MODELS SHOULD EXUBERATE BASIC MODEL BUILDING SKILLS. POOR CRAFTSMANSHIP IS NOT REWARDED. NO ONE JUDGES A CLASS HE/SHE IS ENTERED. ALL DECISIONS OF THE JUDGES ARE FINAL.
6. ALL MODELS SHOULD BE WELL ENOUGH ASSEMBLED TO STAY TOGETHER DURING THE HANDLING AND JUDGING. THE MTMA, TENNESSEE TECH, AND THE JUDGES ASSUMES NO LIABILITY IN THE EVENT DUE TO DAMAGE, FIRE, THEFT, OR PERSONAL INJURY.
7. JUDGES MAY MOVE MODELS, SUBDIVIDE, OR COMBINE CLASSES AT THEIR DISCRETION TO INSURE FAIR COMPETITION. FOUR (4) MODELS CONSTITUTE A CLASS FOR AWARDS.
8. JUDGES AWARD 1ST, 2ND, & 3RD IN EACH CLASS. ADDITIONAL RECOGNITION AWARDS AT THEIR DISCRETION. THE NO SWEEP RULE WILL BE USED. ONE TROPHY PER CONTESTANT PER CLASS.
9. THE MTMA JUDGES WILL DETERMINE "BEST OF" AWARDS.
10. INTERMEDIATE CLASSES ARE FOR YOUTH AGE 12 TO 15. THE JUNIOR CLASS IS FOR YOUTH AGE 11 AND UNDER.
11. DIORAMAS ARE MODELS DISPLAYED TO DEPICT A REALISTIC SCENE OR EVENT.
12. BASES, TERRAIN, FIGURES & EQUIPMENT MAY BE USED WITH A SINGLE MODEL IF NOT OTHERWISE MEETING THE CRITERIA FOR DIORAMAS. JUDGES WILL HAVE THE FINAL SAY ON CLASSIFICATION.
13. MODELERS MUST FILL OUT THE ENRTY FORM COMPLETELY AND SHOULD DOCUMENT SPECIAL FEATURES, HANDLING PRECAUTIONS, CORRECTIONS, ADDED DETAILS & UNUSAL MARKINGS AS WELL AS POSSIBLE
14. ALL ENTRANTS NEED TO HAVE THEIR MODELS PICKED UP BY 5:00 PM OR JUST FOLLOWING THE AWARDS. THE MTMA WILL NOT BE RESPONSIBLE FOR ANY MODELS NOT PICKED UP.
15. ANYTHING NOT COVERED IN THE GUIDELINES WILL BE DISCUSSED BY THE MTMA. THEN A DECISION WILL BE MADE ON THE SUBJECT IN QUESTION.

Modeling Technical Banter....

This article is a result of some e-mail banter between three individuals in our group. The names have been changed to protect identities! It was realized near the end of the banter that this could serve as a great technical article in our newsletter. The article was assembled by reversing the order of the e-mails to put things chronological and changing fonts were used to delineate the three individuals "talking." I hope you enjoy!

OK Guys,

Now, this is going to seem stupid so I'm saying that upfront as I expect to get some smart retorts to my question .

In cleaning paint brushes and/or airbrushes what do you use? Yes, I know you can buy thinner BUT those things aren't very big and I was thinking along the lines of buying a larger bottle of mineral spirits, denatured alcohol, or acetone at Wal-Mart as I'm sure that'd be cheaper in the long run than the same amount of model thinner in bottles. What do you think? I'm guessing one would be better than another and it may matter on the type paint used as well.

Comments?

Actually, it doesn't seem stupid at all, and I wouldn't even have said it did without your CYA statement.

Obviously, your choice of thinner depends on what kind of paint you are using. As I use Tamiya acrylics 99% of the time, I'll tell you what I use to thin it, and let the other guys chime in on Model Master enamels.

Most of the time I thin Tamiya with 70% isopropyl alcohol, and I mix it VERY thin. The Tamiya thinner is apparently mostly alcohol with a little perfume added. Some guys add a couple of drops of Future or actual acrylic retarder to slow the drying, but I've not really found it necessary to do that. I also use the alcohol for cleanup, although Windex works very well for clean up as well. Tamiya's lacquer thinner also works VERY well for thinning their acrylics as well (they are apparently "acrylic lacquers", which I didn't even know existed). The paint really lays down nice and smooth with the LT, and can tend to be a touch grainy with the alcohol, although that buffs out very well with a soft cloth. For clean up with the LT, I use LT from Home Depot. It's much cheaper than the Tamiya stuff, but I don't trust it for spraying, it may be too hot.

That help a little?

Here's my mode of operation on my work bench.

I have one quart of Ace Hardware Mineral Spirits, one quart of Ace Hardware Lacquer Thinner, one pint of Floquil Dio - Sol (equivalent to Testor's Model Master Thinner in the black pint can), and at least one small bottle of Testor's Pla Thinner.

I use the Testor's Pla Thinner bottle to clean my brushes. I like to have two of these, with one being the older that has seen a lot of use, and the other being a little bit cleaner. Use the dirty one for first dip and clean on a rag and final clean the brush from the newer bottle. I also use the dirty thinner for wash on a model when I need to.

I use the Ace Hardware Mineral spirits for thinning and spraying generic Testers Pla or Pactra paint. I use the Floquil DioSol for Floquil (required!) and for thinning Testor's Model Master. It just seems to spray better that way. I

think the Dio Sol has A little bit of retarding agent in it to keep down dusting.

I use the Lacquer thinner for cleaning my air brush of enamel paint (it really eats it up!!!!) and on the few occasions I spray Lacquer paint - I use the Lacquer thinner.

I'm saying Ace Hardware brand for the quart size cans. They have the screw on lids instead of the very small diameter plastic flip squirt lid. I strongly recommend you look for the screw on lid rather than the pop top snap on and off lid. The screw on is easier to use in my opinion, especially for using an eye dropper to pull the liquid out. The quart last a long time.

THIS IS NOT HEALTHY but it is what I do. I take a lot of safety precautions and I am an enamel paint guy.

You may consider going the route of Acrylics!! The ones out there today are not the old Poly-S cheap stuff. It is stuff that actually works. Mike Moore is better source on that medium than me.

It's me again,

No, I don't really "go away" that easily. Thank you for your responses. All of you had somewhat the same thing but different "takes" on it.

Now, what paint do use for what? That is, do you have a preference for a type for armor as opposed to a type for aircraft as opposed to a type for? Yes, Number 2, I know you use enamels while Mike uses acrylics but do you have a preference and why? Yes, Number 1, I got your answer as I was typing this....

Nope...same paint regardless of genre. It's all plastic models. Well, OK, on the rare occasion that I do a figure, I usually use Vallejo because of it's brush painting qualities, and am going to start trying oils, at least for the skin tones. Oils can be blended, where as acrylics have to be layered. The reason not to use the oils overall is they take longer to dry.

That's part of the beauty and mystery of this hobby. What works for one guy often doesn't work for the next.

Some experimentation is required!!!

My reason for enamel is simple. It is what works for me. I tried Polly-S for a short time and had bad results. My second try into acrylics was another disaster (I think I know now why and it was indeed operator error - not a fault of the paint) I suspect if I had it to start over I'd look at acrylics again. Mike gets great finishes and does stuff with that I don't think I can do with enamels.

Color availability is one key. Finding a brand of paint that has the selection of Luftwaffe or RAF or whatever colors is one key for some people. Those being people that don't mix their own colors. I'm kind of a "half breed" - I like to lighten my colors but that is a whole nother story for another day.....

One of the most amazing modelers I ever knew used only Testor's Pla Gloss paint! He mixed all of his colors and sprayed them very well. No need for gloss coat prior to decaling. Then he sprayed on a clear flat.

Yeah, ditto on what Number 2 says about individuality, and experimentation. I was astounded one day at the Hobby Town in Kennesaw. One of the guys in the Model department was talking to a neophyte about using an airbrush, and was recommending Tamyia acrylics as a good paint to start with, and the one he used most often. He then went on to say he uses very little thinner and often sprays straight from the bottle, whereas I probably thin at least 75%. Quite a difference! Of course, I don't know how good his results are because I've never seen his work. One thing I'd assume though is that he must spray at very high pressure, where as I spray at relatively low pressure, normally well under 15 lbs (at least as read on my regulator).

Actually, I was afraid of that answer. I wasn't looking forward to "experimenting". Maybe that's part of the B&W thing I need to work on..... I suspect I was attempting to determine the most "cost effective" way to get back into building.....

Don't let the experimentation thing scare you off. You can try painting a on scraps of plastic. I've got some old models in my sell box that I'll give you to use to try your hand on for painting purposes. I'd say get a bottle of say flat black from each of your prospective brands and try a test strip on a wing of one of these victims models and see what you like.

The Airfix build is a great way to test out some new techniques too ! No one expects these Airfix Spitfires (or what ever you choose) to be a real IPMS Nats winner. Great test ground material!!!!

There are a lot of variables in this!!!!

Which is why experimentation is critical. The most common answer I see on line for how much to thin is that the paint should be thinned to the consistency of skim milk. Maybe I need to get a pint of skim milk (Ava drinks fat free) and put some in my airbrush because I have NO IDEA what the consistency of skim milk would look like in my airbrush. Some of the factors that I can think of that play a part (in no particular order of importance):

- Type of airbrush
- Type of air supply
- Air pressure
- Thinning ratio
- Ambient temperature
- Ambient humidity
- Type of paint
- Type of thinner
- Brand of thinner
- Phase of the moon
- Wife's mood
- Kid's health

General pissyness of boss on given day

Ok, the last 3, and maybe 4 are exaggerations (maybe) but you get the point. You really do have to figure out what works for you, and as you do, you'll find out what you need to change when one of the variables changes subtly. I'm willing to bet Lynn and Tom are the same, but I mix my paint to where I THINK it needs to be, try it out on an index card or scrap plastic, and adjust mix and pressure based on the result of the test. It's not a fixed thing even with a lot of practice/experience. It's more of an iterative, evolutionary thing as you go. So yeah, getting out of the black and white frame of mind, at least as far as painting goes, will be a good thing.

Well said!

To that I'd add:

· distance from the tip of the air brush to the surface of the model.

That can affect the thinning ratio and the air pressure too! It depends on what you're doing at the time.

I keep a victim model on my work bench just to try out before I spray my main project model. I once had a F-4 Phantom body that had lots of Luftwaffe colors on it!!!!

I think the last three all joking aside have a direct bearing on the outcome. I'd add "my own mood" as an X factor in it. If I'm in the right mood I can paint all day long and have a great time. If I'm in a bad mood it'll bleed over to my painting session and I'll wind up re-doing.

I like to compare this to old fashioned pen and ink drafting. (Black & White example ???) You expect draftsman to have repeatable results. A number 00 pen with a straight edge yields the same thickness of line in the same place every time. You'd think every drafts man's work to look the same. But in reality it doesn't work that way there either. Different draftsman have different touches. Some are light handed some are heavy handed (and some don't have a clue!!!!) The tools only give repeatable results to a certain degree. There is an Art to Drafting as well!!!!

Modeling is a bit of three dimensional Art as well!!!! The variables are there but you control the ones you can and try to make the tools at hand yield the results YOU want to yield.

I guess that's one of those B&W things I got to work on. My mind says it's "a flop" if I can't enter it somewhere.... Yeah, "re-programming".....

Oh you can enter it anywhere. Depends on the effort you put into it upfront and what your expectations are.

I'd say start with the goal of finishing something you're happy with. Go from there.

Please yourself first in this hobby, don't go building to please the judges quite yet.

Why is model "philosophy" more appealing to me today than work? Must be Monday.....after a great weekend !!!

Probably the same reason(s) it is for me as well. Or at least partially.

- It's far more interesting to me than work. I'm getting really tired of hashing out the same moisture, schedule, acclimation, store front, cold joint issues time and again. Any diversion is welcome!
- I'm a WORLD CLASS procrastinator. I rarely do today what can be put off to tomorrow.
- I work at home, so there is no boss looking over my shoulder to catch me procrastinating. I'm also not on the office bandwidth, so there is no IT geek to bust me either.

I'm sure there are others, but those are the main ones...

Plus I have the illusion that I'm actually accomplishing something here where my work issues are, like yours perhaps, repeats of the same thing I worked on last month and nobody took my suggestions seriously. Now they are asking for my suggestions again!!! Go figure.....

I think I ought to box all these e-mails that Jeff started and put them into an article in the newsletter!!! That's why I think I'm getting something done here.....

I was thinking the EXACT same thing about the thread as well. Change or eliminate the names to protect the innocent, and put it out there in the newsletter for all to (hopefully) benefit from.

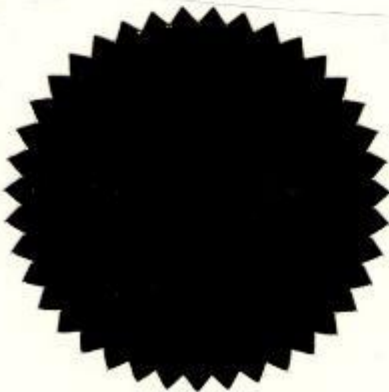
